
Simple Celtic Knots with Nancy Dawes

This project is about a small accordion booklet filled with simple, easy to follow Celtic Knots. I became interested in drawing Celtic Knots about the same time that I found the Zentangle drawing program, around 2013. The concepts of Zentangle, such as "One Stroke at a Time", helped me to figure out how to reliably draw Celtic Knots.

The project this month at the San Diego Book Club starts with a 3 x 12" strip of quality paper such as mixed media paper and cover paper about 3 x 8" made from any paper strong enough to support the accordion folded paper.

Tools:

- Ruler
- Glue or double-sided sticky tape
- Pencil and Pen (e.g., Micron .01 or PN), smudge stick for shading
- Knot grid stencil (if desired)
- Color mediums of your choice





Student Instructions


Let's begin with your 3 x 12" strip of paper:

- Fold strip in half lengthwise
- Fold both ends towards the center fold line creating an accordion strip

 Simple pattern #1 – plain knot As described in class, draw your sets of "sister" lines anywhere you see four circles like a 4-dice. Then draw the side paths. Then draw the corners. Shade as desired. 							







Book Cover and Closure

- Cut cover paper to 3 x 8"
- Glue edge of accordion to the edge of the cover paper
- Fold the accordion book page and then fold over the cover. Crease edge.
- Close the book and then fold over the closure flap.
