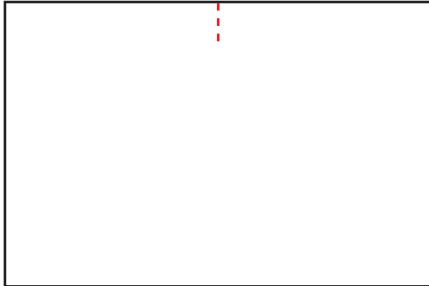

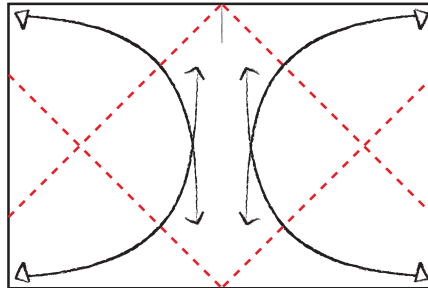
Photo Modular

Chances are you probably have old photographs lying around in boxes. Here is a project to get them out of storage and onto your desk. Folding these simple, modular shapes is easy and fun—and they make great gifts!

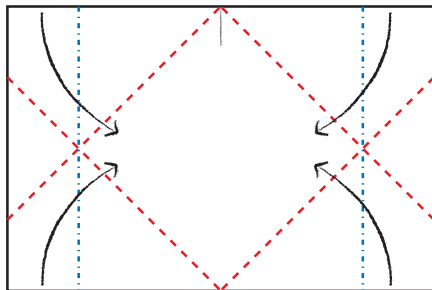




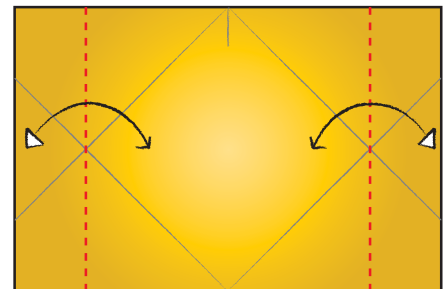
1. Start on the white side up.
Pinch fold the center mark the
long way on the top and bottom.



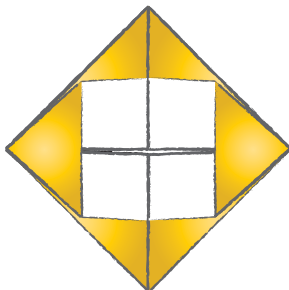
2. Fold top corners down
using the previous pinch as
the guide, unfold. Repeat on
the bottom. Flip over to
other side.



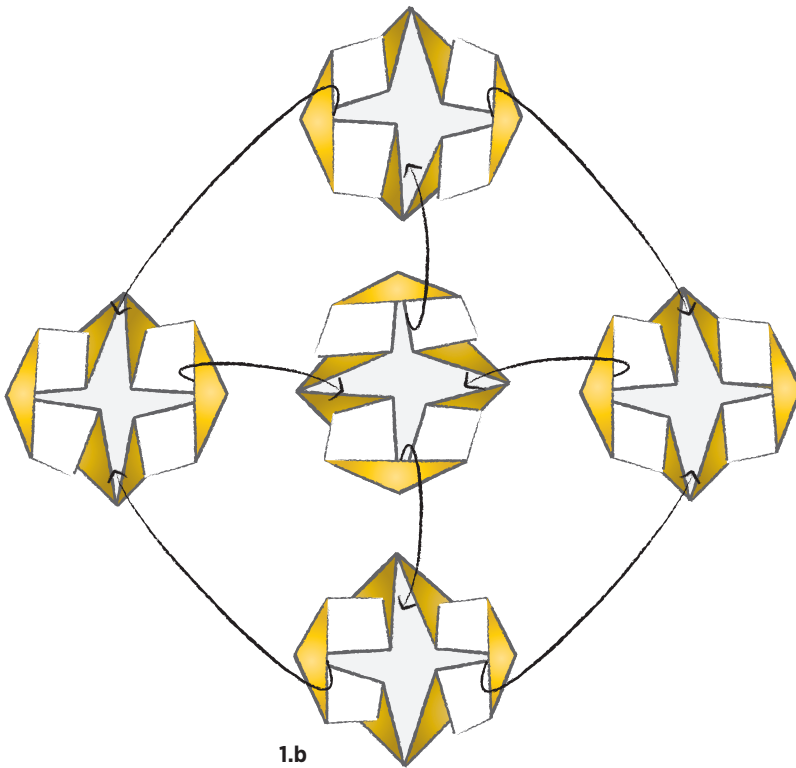
4. Collapse the sides into
waterbomb bases



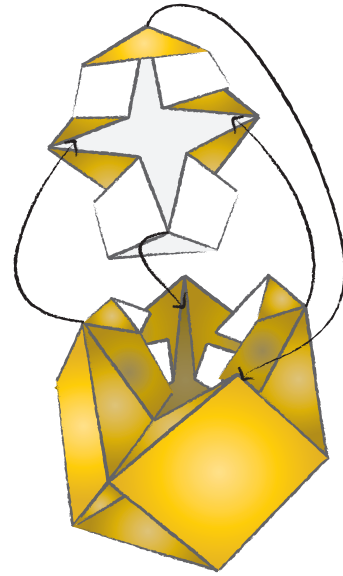
3. Fold side in using the x as
the reference point. where
the two diagonals intersect,
unfold. Flip back over the
side side.

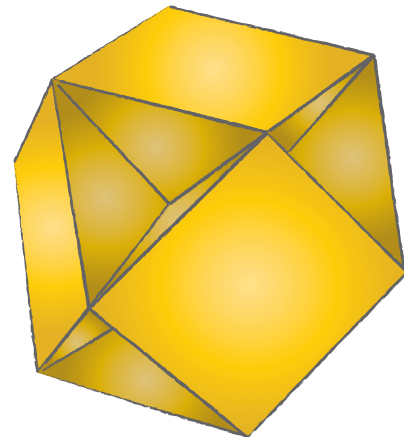


2. Once 5 units are connected, slide and lock the sixth unit into place.

Note: To work out any discrepancies in the corners, just move the units around slightly to form the final shape.

MODULAR ORIGAMI

Modular origami is a type of folding that involves making the same unit multiple times to join together without using any glue. People have come up with all sorts of shapes and often use not only photos but other scrapbooking materials like postcards. The modular stays together thanks to a paper “lock”—the paper squares interlock with each other so the piece doesn’t unfold or come apart. When you build a modular, the final piece is the most difficult one to put in, but with practice it will get easier.
